The new changes in Section 203 designations for 2011 are:

- **The State of Florida is now covered jurisdiction for statewide issued/produced election materials for Spanish.**
- **Broward, Collier, and Glades are no longer covered jurisdictions for its American Indian population. (Collier is still designated as s. 4(f)(4) covered jurisdiction for Spanish.)**
- **Hendry is now a covered jurisdiction for Spanish under both s. 203 and s. 4(f)(4).**
- **Four counties (Lee, Osceola*, Palm Beach and Polk) are newly covered jurisdictions for Spanish.**
